POLICIES AND GRADING FOR BSCI 433

<u>Prerequisites:</u> BSCI 222 and BSCI 330 or equivalent. Successful completion (C- or better) of these courses has been shown to be a good indicator of performance in BSCI 433. Please do not ask to be allowed to take either or both of these courses together with BSCI 433. Permission will be denied.

<u>Lectures and Expectations</u>: All exams will be based on the lecture coverage, but the text readings are essential to giving you a foundation for the lecture. You are strongly advised to do the assigned reading listed for each topic <u>prior</u> to looking at the lectures. Even though these are not live lectures, you are encouraged to take your own notes while observing them. To be successful, you should plan to spend a few hours <u>per lecture topic</u>, in addition to viewing the lectures, to do the reading and review your notes. Preparing for exams will require additional time.

<u>Use of Technology:</u> Given that this course is online, you must have daily access to a computer and reliable internet in order to complete the course requirements.

Make Up Policy: Given the brevity of this course, make up course work will be limited. Exams and assignments are considered Major Scheduled Graded Events and therefore the University medical excuse policy which allows one student signed honor statement attesting to illness does not apply to them. Excused "absences" are: illness with a doctor's note, death in the immediate family, required school activities, and required court appearances. If a doctor will not write you a note, you will need to get a copy of your medical record from them to verify your illness. By law, you are entitled to get a copy of this and it is your responsibility to do so. Documentation must be provided via Canvas email within 24 hours of the missed exam or assignment. Students must notify Dr. Parent prior to the missed exam or assignment due date whenever reasonable.

Note that vacations scheduled during the three weeks of class are NOT valid excuses for missing an exam or assignment. If you have made plans that would cause you to miss any exam or assignment, then you should change these plans or consider dropping the course.

Every student begins the class with 0 points. You earn points throughout the course of the class by your performance on exams and assignments. You have either earned the points or you haven't. The course staff fully expects that these numbers will stand throughout the course. No changes in this scheme will even be contemplated before all the grades are in.

Regrade Policy: Regrades in this course will be rare. Before even contemplating submitting your exam for a regrade, you should carefully review the posted key. If you feel that a question was graded incorrectly, then you should send an email clearly justifying your request. Keep in mind that I can only

grade what you have written on the exam and a regrade is not an opportunity to explain further. To aid your case for a regrade, cite specific lecture slides when possible. Regrades must be submitted within **2 days** of the exam being graded. Exams submitted after the deadline will not be considered. Dr. Parent will review the entire exam and either endorse or not endorse the change. Following the review, points may be added or subtracted, or there may be no change in the grade. **Dr. Parent's judgment is final!**
